24	New evidence became available near the end of last week that confirms that the		
25	NHL continues to adhere to the territorial and		
26	proceedings, denied exist. PSE thus respectfully makes this supplemental submission in		
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support of its Motion for Determination that the Debtors' Interests May Be Transferred to
PSE Notwithstanding the NHL's Refusal to Consent [DE 701] ("PSE Ownership Motion")
and its Motion for Determination that the Coyotes May Be Relocated to Hamilton
Notwithstanding the NHL's Refusal to Consent [DE 824] ("PSE Relocation Motion"). *See In re Financial News Network*, 134 B.R. 737 (S.D.N.Y. 1991) (upholding decision to
allow newly available evidence to be submitted after auction, but before the court's ruling,
because it might affect which bid should prevail), *aff'd*, 980 F.2d 165 (2d Cir. 1992).

II. Background

9 On September 17, 2009, Eugene Melnyk, the owner of the Ottawa Senators, gave an interview that was broadcasted on the Toronto radio station, The Fan590. See 10 Transcript of Sept. 17, 2009 interview of Eugene Melnyk ("Melnyk Interview Tr."), 11 attached hereto as Exhibit 1. The interview may be heard at 12 http://fan590.com/ondemand/media.jsp?content=20090917_180841_672. During that 13 interview,¹ Mr. Melnyk admitted the continued effectiveness of the illegal NHL 14 15 Constitutional territorial veto that the NHL has persistently denied exists. Moreover, his remarks confirm that the real reason for the rejection of Mr. Balsillie's ownership 16 application is this veto and the NHL's animus towards bankruptcy proceedings, rather than 17 any alleged "character" issues. Thus, his remarks support PSE's motions demonstrating 18 that PSE's ownership application and refusal to consider its relocation application were 19 not in good faith. 20

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¹ PSE appreciates and agrees with the Court's statements that it would not consider statements attributed to persons in articles or on the Internet. What PSE is presenting is fundamentally different in that it is a transcript of statements made by a member of the NHL's Board of Governors that are directly at odds with what the NHL in this case represents to be the understanding and position of the Board of Governors. As the Court knows, PSE's opportunity to take discovery from the Board of Governors in this matter was very limited, making this type of public admission important for the Court to consider. Further, as the live interview is available online, there can be no dispute about the fact that Mr. Melnyk in fact made these public comments, which directly contradict the NHL's representations to this Court.

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III. Mr. Melnyk Confirmed that All NHL Teams – Including the Toronto Maple Leafs – Possess a Unilateral Veto Over Relocation of Another Team Into Their Territory

The NHL has denied the existence of the territorial veto throughout these proceedings, downplaying PSE's hard evidence that the veto continues to exist – such as its existence in the NHL Constitution to this day, and the Toronto Maple Leafs letter asserting their veto rights. Instead, the NHL has tried to minimize this irrefutable evidence by calling it part of an imaginary "conspiracy theory," a "big lie" and making sarcastic references to Alice in Wonderland.

In contrast to the NHL assertions, Mr. Melnyk, the owner of the Ottawa Senators and a member of the NHL Board of Governors, recently admitted that every NHL team has the unilateral right under the NHL Constitution to veto any team moving within its territory:

Interviewer: Here's a hypothetical one.... Somebody comes along and says ... I want to put a team in Hull [which is within 50 miles of Ottawa], do you have the constitutional ability to block that?

Mr. Melnyk: I believe we do. Yes, we have territorial rights. Yes, absolutely.

Melnyk Interview Tr. at 17-18 (emphasis added).

Mr. Melnyk went on to confirm that the Toronto Maple Leafs have a territorial veto

and that no other team can play within the Maple Leafs' territory without their consent:

Mr. Melnyk: Mississagua, St. Mike's Mississauga Majors, wouldn't it be great me bringing the Ottawa Senators playing there for an exhibition match? I can't do that. You can't do it.

Interviewer: It's Leafs' territory.

Mr. Melnyk: I know for a fact that I can't do that.

Interviewer: But you could have maybe negotiated with the Leafs to do it?

Mr. Melnyk's admissions of the continued existence of an NHL constitutional territorial veto provide further support of the evidence of such veto that PSE has already provided in this case. *See* PSE Relocation Motion at 17-22; PSE Reply in Support of its Relocation Motion [DE 936] at 15-24; PSE Reply in Support of its Ownership Motion [DE 852] at 14-21.

IV. Mr. Melnyk Confirmed that the NHL's Rejection of PSE's Ownership Application on "Character and Integrity" Grounds was Pretextual

In its Ownership Motion, PSE demonstrated that the NHL's rejection of Mr. Balsillie's ownership transfer application for purportedly lacking "good character and integrity" was entirely pretextual, and that the purported grounds upon which the NHL based its rejection of Mr. Balsillie had no basis in fact. *See* PSE Ownership Motion at 13-33; PSE Reply in Support of its Ownership Motion at 14-28. Rather, the NHL's actions and statements have established that its rejection of Mr. Balsillie's application was based in large part in its animus toward the Debtors' use of these bankruptcy proceedings to maximize the value of the estate to provide the creditors the greatest possible recovery, and PSE's participation in those proceedings. *Id*.

The NHL has been forced to admit that PSE's participation in these bankruptcy proceedings was a "contributing factor" in its rejection of his ownership application. *See* PSE's Opp'n to the NHL's Motion for a Determination that Debtors' NHL Membership Rights May Not Be Transferred to PSE or an Affiliate Thereof [DE 779] at 11-13. Now, Mr. Melnyk has further confirmed that PSE's participation in this bankruptcy – and not Mr. Balsillie's purported lack of "good character and integrity" – was one of the reasons for the NHL's rejection of PSE. When discussing PSE's efforts to purchase the Coyotes, Mr. Melnyk did not once mention Mr. Balsillie's character, and instead focused

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specifically on these bankruptcy proceedings, characterizing them as "a hostile takeover," disparaging Mr. Balsillie's use of the bankruptcy process as a violation of "unwritten rules that are followed" and "taking a bulldozer and going through the door." *See* Melnyk Interview Tr. at 9. As set forth in PSE's Ownership Motion, under well-established principles of bankruptcy law, such animus toward the bankruptcy process was not a good faith basis to reject Mr. Balsillie as an NHL owner.

Indeed, the fact that none of this has anything to do with Mr. Balsillie's character was confirmed by Mr. Melnyk's answer to a follow up question where he was asked what his reaction would be if Mr. Balsillie asked "was there a door that could be opened without a bulldozer." In response, Mr. Melnyk never raised any character issues whatsoever. Rather, his answer demonstrates yet again that the real issues relate to the territorial veto and *where* Mr. Balsillie wants to relocate the team:

> if somebody came and said, you know, Winnipeg, I'd love to buy a franchise and start a team up in Winnipeg, you know what, they would listen, they would say okay, well, what are we going to do about the stadium, it's only 15,000 seats, can you expand it, can you do this. You work the problem that you may have and you have to have the financial wherewithal.

17 Melnyk Interview Tr. at 9-11.

Thus, according to Mr. Melnyk, if Mr. Balsillie's goal was to move the team to Winnipeg, "they [the NHL] would listen" and would "work the problem." Apparently, however, if the goal is to move the team to Hamilton, then Mr. Balsillie lacks adequate character and integrity. LEWIS ROCA

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
