ORDER GRANTING MOTION FOR THE ENTRY OF AN ORDER HOLDING DIRECTV, INC. IN CONTEMPT

This matter having come before the Court on the Debtors' Motion for the Entry of and Order Holding DIRECTV, Inc. in Contempt (the "Contempt Motion"), after such hearing and notice as was required by Title 11 of the United States Code, the Federal Rules of Bankruptcy Procedure, and this Court's Local Rules, and the Court finding just cause for the relief sought by the Motion, it is hereby ORDERED that:

- 1. The Motion for the Entry of and Order Holding DIRECTV, Inc. in Contempt is GRANTED;
- 2. DIRECTV is enjoined from further conduct in contravention of this Court's June 10, 2004 Order, including further conduct that is inconsistent with Pegasus' ownership of and rights in Subscriber Information, such conduct including but not being limited to: (i) accessing and utilizing Subscriber Information in Pegasus' files; (ii) targeting Pegasus subscribers with broadcast information concerning the termination of any agreements with Pegasus and/or switching their subscriptions from Pegasus to DIRECTV; (iii) accessing and using Pegasus Subscriber Information in connection with calls to DIRECTV customer service representatives; and (iv) voiding or deleting Subscriber Information concerning pending Pegasus accounts.

3. DIRECTV is ordered to pay Pegasus compensatory damages in an amount to be determined by the Court to compensate Pegasus for DIRECTV's wrongful appropriation of its Subscriber Information;

4. DIRECTV is ordered to reimburse Pegasus for all reasonable costs and attorney's fees incurred in bringing this proceeding;

5. DIRECTV is ordered to pay to Pegasus punitive damages and any other such sanctions as the Court deems necessary and appropriate to deter future violations of the automatic stay by DIRECTV against Pegasus.
